

Pastoral Letter, November

'There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven'
(Ecclesiastes 3:1)

The writer of Ecclesiastes is a person of age and wisdom – one who has seen it all – and is reflecting upon the vagaries of life, and particularly a life lived without God at the centre. They conclude that without God and his purpose for us, we cannot live a life that is meaningful, and our words and actions that we say and do without reference to God are ultimately lost on the wind.

As the days grow shorter and the year is almost at an end, we look back. Yet again, we have collectively experienced a difficult and disturbing year, but as the writer of Ecclesiastes observes, '...there is nothing new under the sun.' Pandemics, economic uncertainties, conflicts, political upheaval and the 'Conference of the Parties' (now at number 26) will come and go. Life will go on, and if God is placed at the centre, then life will be meaningful.

In September, we very sadly said goodbye to Rev'd Catherine – her season with us is over. The circumstances of her leaving gave me personally, pause for reflection. I concluded that what we want should always be secondary to God's will for us. We can be stubborn and hurtful if we force our own agendas and will upon others. We hurt, not only others, but ourselves – for we are at risk of becoming dogmatic, narrow and bullying and ultimately we lose all sight of God. We see this time and again in politics, business and even the church. The church: the one place that should be a beacon of compassion, generosity and servanthood and yet has, like every other human institution, lost sight of God. As we say in our Confession, 'If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves and there is no truth in us.'

So, what are we to do? If we take Ecclesiastes as our model, we may be forgiven for becoming disillusioned and down-hearted, however, '...here is the conclusion of the matter: Fear God and keep his commandments, for this is the whole duty of humankind.' (12:13). As St Leonard's and St Peter's move into a season of interregnum, trust and obey God for he has his purpose for the churches. His purpose may seem illogical and even mysterious, but with him firmly at the centre of all decision-making that is to come, then the new season will be fruitful.

I implore you all to *listen* to God. I have listened and God has told me it is now time for me to move on – I will be leaving the Church of England and joining the Methodist Church. St Leonard's has been my family for the last five years – a warm, loving and supportive family, and although it seems illogical to me to be leaving at this time, I believe it to be God's will which I must obey.

Listen to God in this season; treat one another kindly, compassionately, generously and selflessly and above all, put God firmly at the centre.

God's blessings be with you all, Elizabeth.

September update

Crewe Foodbank

During September 1,350.55kg of food was donated. Approximately 2,460kg of food was

distributed to 205 people which is representative of 71 households.

We are delighted that a number of schools and churches are collecting for us this Harvest We are relieved to see what have been some very bare and empty shelves starting to fill up again! This week we have had Harvest donations from Beechwood Primary School, Warmingham CE School and St Mary's Church in Sandbach. There are other schools collecting later this month.

As is the case for many foodbanks across the country we anticipate that unfortunately there are going to be considerably more people in need these coming months due to the withdrawal of the £20 weekly Universal Credit payment as well as increasing household fuel costs.

Don't forget that food donations can be dropped off at the back gate of St Paul's Centre any weekday between 9.30am and 3.30pm We continue to have low supplies of UHT milk, jam, tinned fruit, tinned vegetables, tinned potatoes, tinned meat, crisps and snacks.

A CELEBRATION OF ORGAN PLAYING

The resident organist at St Peter's Church, Ruth Edge, has reached an enormous milestone of 50 years playing the organ in various churches in the area.

Ruth who grew up in Church Minshull, attended Sunday School and was a chorister at St Bartholomew's Church. The organist then was Ruth's aunt, Mary Parton. At around the age of 14, Ruth who had been showing an interest in the organ during choir practice, was encouraged to give it a go seriously.

She was already a competent piano player, and for that Ruth says she owes a great debt to her school piano teacher Dorothy Smithson, who sadly died in 2020. She was 104 and happily Ruth was able to



visit her in her care home, even though Covid was at its height.

Ruth's aunt encouraged her organ playing for services in a very gradual manner. Firstly, by sitting alongside her and allowing her to play the odd note, then one verse, moving on to one hymn. Ruth believes this was during a Good Friday service and maybe this was why, as there were not so many people in Church and the hymns were much slower paced. What a lovely, kind, and thoughtful aunt.

The Rev Peter Gains was the vicar at St Bartholomew's, and he too encouraged Ruth and gave her one piece of advice, "Open these two stops and also these two stops" and then left her to it, encouraging her to practise when she could, and play during services when she felt confident enough.

Ruth fondly remembers the Sunday School egg and flower services, that took place at St Bartholomew's. Explaining to me, they were held in May each year and the Sunday School then delivered posies and eggs to The Elms in Crewe.

At this point in her career, Ruth ignored the fact that the organ had pedals! She practised alone and gradually became more confident, remembering being told, "Focus on the bottom note".

I'm happy to say Ruth now plays the organ using the pedals with gusto, and pace! You may have noticed that when Ruth takes communion, she is in her stocking feet? This allows her to feel the pedals more sensitively. I have to say, she does have a lovely array of novelty, colourful socks!

Ruth and John were married at St Bartholomew's in September 1979 and her lovely aunt had wanted to play the organ for the happy event, but sadly she died in June of that year. So, Ruth played the organ for her funeral instead. What a fitting way to say goodbye to someone who had encouraged her so much.

In 1979 organists were paid £18 to play at weddings and £15 to play at funerals, not that she took anything for playing at her aunt's funeral, a theme which she has generously continued for friends and family.

Once married and working full time on the farm Ruth began to play both at St Bartholomew's and occasionally at St Peter's. Fitting this around family life and farming commitments. At St Peter's she played evensong and occasionally stood in for Mary Corsbie, Monica Bermingham's mother. This was a new experience, as the organ at St Peter's has three keyboards in comparison to St Bartholomew's two.

Over time Ruth played for more and more services at St Peter's, including evensong, occasional mornings, weddings, funerals, and christenings until she built up to the amount she plays today. During those first tentative days playing at St Peter's, Ruth tells me she had massive support from two special people, Lillian Riley and John's mother, Margaret.

Whilst playing at St Peter's, Ruth has also had the support of four very musical vicars who have helped and advised her along the way. These were the Revs. Peter Gains, Howell Jones, Gordon Geddes, and Philip Goggin. Marjorie Geddes also played the organ and shared her time there with Ruth and was very happy to give further advice and support. Having a vicar who was willing to stand in occasionally was good and something sadly

missing now. Especially as Rod Cash is so poorly, meaning Ruth is very busy with little room for respite, especially if playing clashes with calf feeding!

Ruth has played organs in other local churches, including Worleston- playing at the wedding of one of the farm employees. Bunbury- where the organ is an electronic one and Pulfordfor the Young Farmers County Chairman's Service.

In Warmingham, at our sister church of St. Leonard's, she is always happy to play and to take the choir with her to add a little to their special events, such as the Wakes, Harvest and Carol services, with the odd wedding and funeral thrown in for good measure.

One of the most memorable organs though was whilst away on a farming mission. She visited the estate of William Weld at Lulworth Cove. There was a private Chapel on the estate and Ruth was invited to play the organ. She did this in an organ loft looking down into the Chapel which was a very different experience for her.

Ruth doesn't have a favourite piece of music, but she admits she does prefer to play the traditional hymns and organ pieces. She does however love, Angel Voices, Ye Holy Angels Bright and The Day Thou Gavest. Ruth often plays Edelweiss, which has become something of a family funeral tradition. It was her Mum's favourite and has now been played by Ruth at her Mum's, Dad's, and other family members funerals. Some other favourites she remembers playing are Over the Rainbow, and The Lambeth Walk.

Ruth has lots of funny stories, but two wedding ones stand out. The time she had to play the Bridal March twice, because she had been given the signal too early and the photographer was still clicking away outside, with an empty aisle inside!

The other was when she had to keep a groom calm, because his bride-to-be was 30 mins late, due to a car breakdown.

However, the best thing, about playing the organ for people at these services is seeing them through a difficult time at funerals or seeing their happy faces after a good Sunday service, a Christening, Blessing, Wedding, Harvest, Easter, Christmas etc. Even though occasionally the services may be interrupted by naughty elves, bunnies, unruly children, and animals!

We are so grateful at St Peter's that Ruth has continued to play when it was allowed during the Covid crisis. To listen to and sing with live music, rather than streamed has been an absolute joy. Ruth also says that having a choir singing with her, makes her feel less exposed and gives her real support and confidence. During the strange times we have all recently experienced the friendship group and bond within the choir has grown and brought us all closer together, making us appreciate the effort Ruth has made on our behalf, not only as a choir, but as a congregation and community.

On behalf of us all Ruth, thank you and many congratulations on 50 years of organ playing, long may it continue.

We have also arranged some taster yoga sessions for the children. We will be running a yoga club after half term. Well-Being Day Video Clip




St Peter's Updates


