


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Parish Safeguarding Officer: Vacancies

The late Archbishop of Cape Town, Desmond

Tutu, frequently said of Christians "We are an Easter People" and he was right, because the only reason for our Faith is that Christ is alive, here and now. We are not Triumphalist, burying our heads in a moment of glory, to forget the problems of the day. But, we are unmistakably on the Winning Side.

During World War Two, fighting was still going on in Burma (Myanmar) when the Japanese had already surrendered and the War was in fact over. We face great problems today, both personal, local, National and International. But Christ is Risen, a phrase often used by people of Faith and none in the Greek-speaking world ("Christos anesti") rather like the Happy Easter of the English-speaking countries... Whether people believe that, or like it, or not, it is true, a Fact, not an idea.

If we live with that truth, no matter what problems surround us, we can be assured that Christ HAS won, and His victory includes those problems, even though they still trouble us, frequently.

A fairly modern Easter Hymn has this wonderful chorus:

"Because He lives, I can face tomorrow, Because He lives, all fear is gone; Because I know He holds the future, And life is worth the living, Just because He lives!"




This couple like a good walk, even though the lady has gammy knees! So we visited the South West Coastal path at various places. One of my favourites was a beach called Poldhu



During the two year time laps, many photographs were exchanged, and family events commented on, which went back over many years. It is fair to say though we started in some cases as strangers. We are now much closer.


My brother Nigel co-ordinated the event on 16th October 2021 which included the family tree and all the many photographs which were displayed on two power points during the event.

When there were Three

The news of the closure of the "Minshull United Reformed Church" (Church Window December 2021) reminded me of how some eighty years ago, when I was a child, Minshull Vernon had three places of worship: St. Peter's Church, the Congregational Chapel at Cross Lane and the Wesleyan Chapel on the Middlewich Road near to St. Peter's.

The Congregational Chapel (later "Minshull United Reformed Church") was known to many as "Crosslanes" Chapel. Maybe it should be called "Cross Lane" Chapel since it stands at the junction of Cross Lane which runs to Church Minshull, Eardswick Lane to Bradfield Green and Brookhouse Lane which meets the Middlewich Road in Walley's Green where stands the Queen Victoria Cross.

So there was a choice of where to go on Sundays and to some extent it depended on where one lived and when you were young it was a case of the "nearest becoming the dearest."

Residents of Walley's Green could reach Cross Lanes Chapel by walking along Brookhouse Lane or use the footpath across the fields. There were few cars in those days and during the war-years petrol was rationed, but for some it would be horse and trap!

Children in the parish attended the school in Bradfield Green where on Sundays there was St. Peter's Sunday School with Miss Hilda Bate and visits by the Rev. Pugh. Children from Walleys Green who used the Crossville bus service to and from school would go to Cross Lanes Sunday School.

Among the adult community there were those who held strong views and would attend either a Church or a Chapel of their choice rather than simply the nearset to home. To some extent this divided the community and sometimes divided families! One was either "Church" or "Chapel" and rarely attended the other!

My father's family in Bradfield Green were "Chapel" folk whereas my mother came from a farming family in Church Minshull and they were "Church".

When I was very young I would be taken by my grandmother to the Wesleyan Chapel in the morning and to Church in the evening by my mother. This would be St. Peter's or St. Bartholomew's since many Sunday afternoons and evenings were spent at the family farm at Wades Green.

(No thought then that one day the farm's cottages would belong to St. Peter's {Church Window, February 2022})

Attendance at St. Bartholomew's was a new experience because unlike St. Peter's and St. Leonard's the pews there are the high-sided "box" type where, to misquote the better-known saying, "children could be heard but not seen!"

N.B. For many years, St. Peter's shared its vicar with St. Bartholomew's as it now does with St. Leonard's.

The Wesleyan Chapel was small and had a house attached which in an earlier time had been home to a large Crawford family, two members of which died in WW1 and their names are to be found on the war memorial at Bradfield Green.

The entrance porch to the Chapel was so close to the road-side that one could descend from the car (or carriage) and enter the chapel without getting wet or one's hat blowing off!

Attendance was good and favoured by some from outside the parish including a farmer and his wife from Wimboldsley Hall who would arrive in a limousine and dressed in fine clothes and fancy hats!

The chapel closed in 1957 and so the choice no longer exists but we can be extremely grateful that the farmers from Wimboldsley Hall today have chosen to given their whole-hearted support to St. Peter's!

One thing you need to put at the top of your list this Spring is to simply MOVE.


Whether you like gardening, cycling, jogging, walking or any other activity, make certain that you do some of it every day.

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




Jesus' tomb had been sealed with a large stone. Very early Sunday morning, some of Jesus' friends went to put spices on his body.







They saw the tomb was empty and only the cloths that Jesus' body had been wrapped in lying there. So they went back to the others.

Mary Magdalene stayed by the tomb, crying. She didn't understand that Jesus was no longer dead. When she looked in the tomb there were 2 angels.













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
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
