





Warmingham Community Event to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee – Thursday 2nd June, 6.30pm in the Village Hall





The Queen's Platinum Jubilee

In February this year, HM the Queen became the longest reigning monarch in British history celebrating seventy years of service. Until recently she attended church every week and still did a full week's work at the age of 96!

Traditional images of monarchy portray power, status, and superiority over other people. In biblical times, monarchs were to

be feared. When teaching His disciples about leadership, Jesus said, "The kings of the Gentiles (pagans) lord it over them; and those in authority over them are called benefactors." A benefactor was a conspicuously generous person who acted in a way that made the recipient feel obligated. (photo: Jacob King/PA Wire/PA Images).

What is the secret of the Queen's consistency of character and service? In 2002 she said this: "I know just how much I rely on my faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning. I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings, and to put my trust in God." These are wise words from somebody who draws her strength from the Christian Faith and can inspire all of us who want to make our lives count!

The Queen has been an example of joyful, wise, and generous service on behalf of others all her life. Six months before her coronation she asked the nation and Commonwealth to 'pray that God may give me wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making, and that I may faithfully serve Him and you, all the days of my life.' Paul urges us to pray for all in authority, 'that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness.'(1 Timothy 2:2).

It is her commitment to serving God and the nation which stands out in her life. Even before she became Queen, she made a promise, which she has kept for over seventy-five years: 'I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service' (21st birthday broadcast, 21 April 1947). It was just the same when she became Queen in 1952. Queen Elizabeth has consciously and deliberately applied Christ's teaching to her reign for seventy years. She has outlived scores of leaders,

some with ambitions beyond their abilities, and a few with delusions of grandeur. Her ideals have outlasted theirs. Consistent, determined, charming, and single-minded, she has held before her the model of Christ, washing His disciples' feet.

This year we celebrate her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee. A special extended bank holiday weekend this month will give communities across the UK a chance to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

Over fifty countries will light beacons on 2nd June to start four days of events: a spectacular pageant, a 'platinum party' at Buckingham Palace, Jubilee lunches and street parties across the nation. Many churches will be holding special services and events. A centrepiece of the celebrations will be a Service of Thanksgiving at St Paul's Cathedral, London, on Friday 3rd June. It is fitting that the service will form a key part of the Jubilee, as the Queen has been vocal in speaking about her Christian faith in a series of high-profile broadcasts.

In her Christmas Day broadcast in 2016, she said: "Jesus Christ lived obscurely for most of his life, and never travelled far. He was maligned and rejected by many, though he had done no wrong. And yet billions of people now follow his teaching and find in him the guiding light for their lives.

"I am one of them, because Christ's example helps me see the value of doing small things with great love, whoever does them and whatever they themselves believe."

The Queen Mother subscribed to daily devotional Bible reading notes. She regularly read Bible stories to the young princesses, Elizabeth and Margaret and taught them to pray. Both girls started their weekly school lessons with half an hour of Bible reading, under the guidance of their governess, and weekly church attendance has been a lifelong pattern for the Queen, who is said to keep a well-read Bible by her bedside.

This month we shall sing, 'God save the Queen' with more gusto than ever.

Passion Play



Last month I was lucky enough to attend two very different events at the Cathedral.

On Good Friday I went to see the Passion Play which was incredibly realistic, moving and in parts very brutal.

It began under the Eastgate clock as Jesus rode into town on a donkey and the people welcomed him with singing, dancing and waving of palms. From there we were invited to follow the actors through the streets to watch the events unfold.


We witnessed the anger of Jesus in the temple, berating the moneylenders and stallholders. The Last Supper, the Garden of Gethsemene and the capture of Jesus.


His trial before both Pontious Pilate and Herod took place outside the town hall.

Jesus was eventually handed over to the Roman soldiers at the behest of the crowd, whilst Pilate washed his hands of the whole affair.

The soldiers stripped and whipped him before making Jesus carry his cross through the town. This was so realistic a few people near me were in tears. Whilst carrying his cross Jesus stumbled on a number of occasions and was offered a drink and was relieved of his cross for a short while.

Outside the main doors of the Cathedral the soldiers nailed Jesus to the cross. Again very realistic and hard to watch.






The cross was then positioned between two others and Jesus was jeered and taunted by the soldiers. During this time Jesus cried out and asked for their forgiveness and his own release. As a cloud began to cover the sun a loud drum roll, like thunder heralded the moment that Jesus died.

During all this time one of the most moving interpretations of the story played out. Mary, mother of Jesus and Mary Magdalene tried to comfort him by singing a very beautiful version of Once in Royal David's City. I definitely had tears in my eyes at this point.

The body was eventually taken down and moved inside the Cathedral. The crowd dispersed to get on with their day and wait for the promise of Easter Sunday.

This was not an enjoyable event but one I'm glad to have witnessed. I would highly recommend it if you've never seen it, just don't take small children. Easter Sunday had so much more joy and meaning a few days later.



Sound Bathing

A very different event I attended was an evening of sound bathing inside the Cathedral from 7-9.15pm.

It was led by a couple who bring numerous instruments into the Cathedral. They encourage participants to bring blankets and cushions with them to make the whole experience a warm, comforting one.

Initially you are led into meditation by recognising your breathing and following the explained breathing patterns. Once the group are all relaxed the sound bath begins.

The sounds vary from the human voice, gentle tingling of bells to really loud reverberations of gongs and drums. The sounds bounce off the Cathedral walls and the vibrations can be felt through the body. All the time the leader is talking or singing you through the various stages of the meditation.

Depending on how well you can relax into the moment the results can be amazing. A very deep feeling of connection to your inner self, love and serenity is how I would describe it. I was shocked when the two hours were up. All sense of time had disappeared. I was so spaced out I had to drive home with my windows wide open. Just in case!!! I'm definitely going to go again though.

Reminder - Alteration to St. Peter's Flower Rota

Thank you to everyone on the Flower rota who arrange altar flowers at St. Peter's Church. Several people have expressed a wish to arrange flowers on a fortnightly basis and it does seem like a good idea. This would mean your name 'coming round' less often. It would work as follows – if it was your turn to arrange flowers on

the altar (and in the two small vases on the sill by the war memorial) for Sunday, 19th June, your flowers would stay in place for Sunday, 26th June. BUT it would mean that you will need to pop into church during the second week of your turn on the rota to check the flowers have water and remove any dead flowers. If you were on holiday during the second week, maybe a friend could check the flowers for you. We will try this new Flower rota during the year to experiment if it is working successfully.

The new Flower rota commenced after Easter until Lent 2023. A copy is displayed in the church porch and flower rota names will also appear in the Church Window monthly magazine. If you need to borrow a choir vestry key to gain access into church please phone Alison on her mobile (07756 475534) or Chris Ward (Churchwarden – 01270 668703).

Flowers are usually placed in church either on a Friday or a Saturday before Sunday services. However, please check if there is a wedding due to take place on the same weekend as your turn on the rota. If there is to be a wedding, it is advisable to use neutral shades for altar flowers to blend in with the bride's colour theme. The brass vases will require polishing first with brasso (you will find brasso in the sink unit cupboard). If the existing flowers are too good to be thrown away, they can be placed in a glass vase by the memorial book in the chancel. All dead flowers and foliage should be placed in the green wheelie bins situated in the churchyard.

If anyone wishes to join the flower rota, please speak to Alison. Thank you.

Fans of the popular *Star Wars* films were surprised when Darth Vader said to Luke Skywalker "I am your father." This unexpected disclosure paved the way for future surprises in the episodes that followed.

Many times, Jesus surprised His hearers with parables that had unexpected twists and turns. No doubt He astonished the disciples when He first called God 'Father' and went on to instruct them to pray saying "Our Father in heaven...". No one had called God 'Father' before!

Shortly before His arrest, trial and crucifixion, Jesus talked to His disciples about God the Father. He said: "In my Father's house are many rooms." This prompted Philip to ask: "Show us the Father, that is all we need." Jesus replied: "Whoever has seen Me *has* seen the Father."

Jesus knew this concept would be hard to grasp and so had to frequently speak about God as His Father. For three years the disciples had listened to profound teaching and witnessed miracles. They knew Jesus was different, but as His ministry drew to a close they were learning more about the special relationship that God had with Jesus.

On 19th June it will be Father's Day. This is an occasion to remember the role our dads are playing now or have played in our lives. Hopefully, we have good memories and recall times of loving care they showed to us.

Unfortunately, some people do not know their fathers, or they have been absent for long periods or may be neglectful, deceitful, or abusive. Sadly, some children and adults would rather not remember their fathers, having suffered some trauma or family breakdown.

It is good to know that God is not like this. Jesus came to reveal God as our Heavenly Father, who is loving, compassionate, merciful, forgiving, and caring. God is the model father who knows what is good for us and wants the best for us.

So, Father's Day can be a reminder that we are God's children, and that we can possess the blessings He has kept for us. In the story of our lives God has revealed Himself in a surprising way. He says to each one of us 'I am your Father'. Now that is something to celebrate!

Take a walk on the wild side!

How neat do we like our gardens to be? Full of manicured lawns, with immaculate flower beds?

Well, yes and no. A recent survey by BBC's Gardener's World magazine has found that more than half (54 per cent) of



gardeners now include 'uncultivated areas' in their garden. And some 44 per cent of gardeners have also set up a wildflower area.

Certainly, Nature could use a helping hand just now. In 2019 32 per cent of us saw a butterfly in our garden. By 2020 that was down to 21 per cent. By 2021 that was down again to just 16 per cent. Simple tips to re-wild your garden:

- Avoid chemical pesticides and herbicides, which also kill 'good bugs', butterflies and bees.
- Tolerate as much mess as you can. Leave wood and leaf piles for hedgehogs and invertebrates.
- Set aside some room where grass can grow longer, and wildflowers can bloom.
- Don't pull up all your weeds they can be a critical source of pollen for bees.

Over the last year, our Eco Warriors have been working hard to improve our school environment and the world we live in. Within school, they have promoted lots of different ways to help save our planet and raise everyone's awareness of biodiversity.

Warmingham Parish Council - Chairman's Report May 2022

The Parish Council have had a busy year representing the interests of the Parish of Warmingham. During the year we have welcomed Councillor Newton onto the Parish Council. We have continued to consult with Cheshire East Council on highway problems around the village especially the condition of the road surfaces and drainage issues. We will continue to monitor problems and report them, as necessary. We are also looking at ways we can reduce the number of HGV's travelling through the village.

We have continued to monitor the speed and the amount of traffic travelling through the village. This has been aided by our speed indicating devices and the community speed watch volunteers and our local PCSO who deter speeding traffic in the village.

We continue to monitor the number of ANSA lorries that travel through the village as they are causing tremendous damage to the roads. During the year, the Parish Council have met with ANSA to try and reduce the HGV movements travelling through the village. We will continue to monitor the situation going forward.

Hs2 Crewe-Manchester hybrid bill has been lodged with Parliament and the Parish Council is in contact with them and will lobby to try to minimise the impact on the village during the construction phase.

We have continued to discuss and comment on planning proposals that affect the village and we will continue to do so in the future.

The development of a neighbourhood plan for the village has had to be put on hold due to Covid. We hope to restart it shortly and we will keep the village informed about its progress.

This year is the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, and the Parish Council is holding an event for the village to commemorate it. This will take place on the evening of Thursday 2nd June with the lighting of a beacon and a fireworks display. Thanks to Councillor Price and Councillor Newton for helping to organise the event.

The Parish Council have again given a donation to St. Leonards Church for the maintenance and lighting of the Church Memorial Clock.

I would like to thank Gaynor our Parish Clerk for her continued work and support for the Parish Council. Also my fellow councillors for their support during the last year. I would especially like to welcome Councillor Newton to the Parish Council and the work he has done in painting the finger post

signs in the village. Also, to Councillor Rowe and his wife Debs and other volunteers for maintaining the flower planters in the village.

I would also like to thank Councillor Wray our local Cheshire East Councillor for attending our meetings. Your support is much appreciated.

Finally, thanks to David Crawford who continues to do a great job as lengths man keeping the village tidy with his litter picking duties.

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Christian Aid spends £8m from British people to help Ukraine

The international development agency, Christian Aid, will spend £8m on vital supplies over the next six months to help the Ukrainian people.

The money comes from donations to DEC, the Disasters Emergency Committee, that has raised more than £300m for Ukraine. That's around £3 on average donated by every person in the UK.
