Message from Reverend Paul



Often when things are empty, we are somewhat disappointed. You reach for your mug of tea, only to find it empty. You glance at the fuel gauge on your car, a costly empty. The engineer booked for an important repair fails to turn up, the empty promises resonating around your mind. Empty often leaves us feeling just that – empty inside. But when it comes to Easter empty means something altogether different.

There are plenty empty moments in that first Easter. At the last supper, when Jesus said one of his closest friends would betray him, then when Judas led the authorities to arrest Jesus. The emptiness of Peter when the cock crowed after his third denial of being one of Jesus' friends. The empty charges thrown at Jesus, the empty actions of Pilate. And despite Jesus telling his followers that he would be handed over to death, the emptiness and anguish of the cross.

The emptiness of Easter is obvious, and yet in emptiness great joy and hope is found. On Easter day the empty tomb changed everything.

'On the first day of the week, very early in the morning, the women took the spices they had prepared and went to the tomb. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they entered, they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus.' Luke 24

The empty tomb was the sign of full promises. The empty tomb confirmed Jesus' claim, "I am the resurrection and the life." The empty tomb was a sign of hope and joy because it confirmed Jesus was who he said he was.

'On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jewish leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" After he said this, he showed them his hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord.' John 20

Life can throw all sorts at us, much of which is challenging and can at times leave us feeling empty. This Easter, look to the empty tomb, be encouraged, see the hope and joy that it brings. The empty tomb showing Jesus as the resurrection and the life. And when Jesus talks about life, he is talking about life that is anything but empty, "I have come that they may have life and have it to the full" John 10:10.



Study Theme Update



This term our study theme has been based around the book 'Animalium'.

Otters' Class

This half term Otters have been looking at the topic theme of 'Come Outside' as Geographers, we have been exploring our immediate environment and looking at all that it has to offer. As Scientists, we identified how in spring there are changes such as trees and their new buds, the new shoots of flowers emerging and the wildlife and mini-beasts that are starting to appear. We have also closely monitored growing our own cress, sunflowers and caterpillars and are looking forward to releasing them after the holidays for our starter to our new topic. As Artists we have created some wonderful artwork based on snails and sunflowers and sketched some of our sightings on our woodland walk.







Hedgehogs' Class

Inspired by our 'Wow' starter of a Creepy Crawly Show, we have been learning lots about minibeasts and their micro-habitats. Our narrative writing was based on the Snail Trail by Ruth Brown and our Science explorations enabled us to write about minibeasts and create riddle poetry. The theme of mini beasts has flowed through other curriculum subjects such as PE, where we choreographed and performed our own 'Ugly Bug Ball' dance; Art, where we have developed our skills of using viewfinders to sketch parts of microhabitats; Design Technology, where we designed and made bug houses and Computing, where we have been coding to navigate our minibeasts through the garden. Our local history studies took us to Beeston Castle, where we have learnt about how Ranulf trained to be a knight. This gave us the ingenuity to make our own 'Castle & Sun' paintings in the style of Paul Klee. For our 'fantastic finish', we have completed our minibeasts journey by becoming minibeasts!







Squirrels' Class

This term in squirrels our topic has been centred around the book 'Animalium'. The children have absolutely loved this science-based topic and it has brought so much excitement and joy to their learning. We started the term looking at the human body and how we stay fit and healthy. We have since gone on to learn about the skeleton system of animals and humans, how the digestive system works, different types of teeth, food chains and the history of Chester Zoo.

This has brought lots of opportunities for the children to engage in their learning. We have investigated the nutrients in food, made different teeth using marshmallows, researched about animal, visited Chester Zoo and made our own poo - which I think was one of the highlights!

The children have worked well together and produced some brilliant work. Now another term has finished, we can rest and recharge for our summer term in Squirrels.
















Badgers' Class

This term, Badgers' Class study theme has been based in the Americas. They have adored learning about the continents of North and South America, chocolate, the Mayan Civilisation, and the Amazon Rainforest. Our learning journey started with a visit to 'Chocolate Whirled' where the children learnt about how the simple coco bean is transferred into a delicious bar of chocolate before they made their very own bars of chocolate.

The children then learnt about how the Mayan's discovered chocolate, were one the most sophisticated early civilisations before moving onto the detailed study of the rainforest and the animals who live. Whilst learning about the rainforest we researched the pros and cons for deforestation.

The children have applied their knew knowledge in lots of different ways such as writing a historically accurate story based in Mayan civilisation, created some maths problems using the Mayan number system (not an easy challenge!) as well as using the facts we have learnt about deforestation. Instead to sharing their own options about deforestation, the children were given a specific role as a logger, pharmacist, conservationist, forest inhabitant, government official, fast-food restaurant owner, environmental scientist and cattle farmer in the debate. They then had to defend their option instead of their own personal view. As you can imagine this wasn't easy but great fun!

Carpark Reminder
