

We do know that the church is very grateful to the Jinks family for initially gifting the land, and that there is a Roman road running through the field, between the vicarage and the Community Hall. Recently Carl and I mowed a prayer labyrinth into the bottom left field, which everyone is really welcome to come and use.

This reminded me of the beautiful quotation from Jeremiah, given above. History teaches us that there were many different belief systems here in these parts before Christianity spread. The Christian faith, however, teaches us that God created all things, and that the Word, Jesus Christ, was with God the Father and inextricably involved in creation. Therefore we believe that Christ was here long before anyone acknowledged his presence or even his existence.

So when we walk the paths of the labyrinth we are walking on ground that is ancient, that has been walked by people doing all sorts of things, believing all sorts of things. But we are also walking in the footsteps of Christ. And because a labyrinth only has one path, though with many twists and turns, we can be sure that we are safely held in God's embrace. We can therefore be free to reflect and pray – to maybe let go of fears or grudges – and to choose the path of life.

Mown Prayer Labyrinth

Labyrinths are ancient pathways found across the world. The winding path helps us to 'unwind', to let go and rest in God. Members of the early church as well as Medieval pilgrims have used them as a support for prayer. Today, labyrinths offer a spiritual space for prayer and reflection, providing a stilling space in a busy world.





Your labyrinth prayer time can be as open or as focused as you would like it to be. You might want to simply enter the labyrinth and walk or:

- ♦ Read and reflect on a line or two from Scripture
- Or Hold a memory or a photo of a loved one you wish to remember or pray for while you are in the labyrinth
- Onsider an experience in your life where you are seeking healing or forgiveness and talk to God in the labyrinth
- Think about a key celebration in your life and give thanks

A labyrinth is different from a maze.

A maze is designed to be full of dead-ends.

A labyrinth has only one path that always leads to the centre... if you stay on the path you cannot get lost.

Hello, it is a nice change to be writing to you as the world starts to open up and we have a message of hope. Even with such a positive outlook on the future, we would like to draw your attention to some growing trends we have identified that could help you remain safe.

Lockdown has been a tough time for us all, including criminals that specialise in acquisitive crimes, such as burglaries. These crimes are starting to grow in the Leighton area, especially the more rural areas, and outbuildings are often targets. We have included some tips to help keep your items and homes secure:

- -Buy a high quality padlock for sheds (Check it is locked before you go to bed! 95% of burglars are opportunists who check for unlocked doors!)
- -Install a motion detected security light. This will draw your attention if activated and criminals like to work in the dark
- -Install CCTV (Even if these are fake cameras, which are a lot cheaper, they make your property are a less appealing target)
- -Install a visible alarm

The idea of crime prevention is to raise the risk of the crime above the reward they would have got had they successfully completed their crime. With this, it means that hopefully we can make Leighton and the surrounding areas less appealing for criminals who will go elsewhere.

We have also noticed a rise in scams, which even very experienced people are falling for so we would like to draw your attention to the following:

- -Royal Mail: A text is sent to your phone saying that a parcel has been held up due to an outstanding payment. The text asks you to pay a nominal fee via the link provided. The link takes you to a web page that contains the Royal Mail logo and asks for your bank details. After entering them they have access to your account. As a note, if Royal Mail does require payment due to an outstanding shipping cost, a delivery note will come through your door with details on how to pay it and usually to go to the depot.
- -HMRC: This scam usually starts with you being called by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs to tell you that you owe tax and because of your failure to pay it there has been a warrant issued for your arrest. This is done to increase the pressure on the target and in the panic they transfer money or buy vouchers to give to an individual to pay the fine. The fraudsters rely on the panic from the target and we would like to assure you, no government agency, or police force, will ever call you to tell that you're wanted and can clear this by payment. Under British Law this would involve a court date and many, many letters sent to your beforehand.

We have both really enjoyed meeting you all at the Sunday Services and want to express our thanks for the warm welcome you have given us. If there is anything you think we can help with, please speak to Revd Cleghorn, who can pass our details onto us or will contact us on your behalf.

We have also restocked the community hall with purse bells located on the table next to the door.

22nd July: Mary Magdalene

What do we really know about Mary Magdalene?

Fake news is not new. Perhaps one old example is the assertion that Mary Magdalene was a prostitute. Back in the 6th Century, Pope Gregory is said to have confused her with two other women in the Bible. Medieval Bible scholars also attempted to name an unidentified sinful woman who had washed and anointed the feet of Jesus. As Mary Magdalene is mentioned in the next chapter, they regarded her as the same person! After this, many classical artists painted Mary in various states of undress, perpetuating a falsehood.



So what do we really know about Mary? The Gospels tell us that she came from Magdala, a town in Galilee, and Jesus healed her by casting out seven evil spirits. After this she followed Jesus, with other women, on His ministry providing resources. Later, Mary watched Jesus die on the cross, and having cared for His needs while He was alive, wanted to care for Him after His death.

It was when Mary went to anoint the body of Jesus at the tomb that the risen Jesus appeared to her. He told

Mary to go to His disciples and tell them about His return to Heaven. She was obedient and became the first emissary of the resurrection. In those days, the witness of a woman was worthless. Despite ridicule, Mary had the courage to speak about Jesus in a place of great disbelief. We have to ask ourselves do we have the same courage as Mary? How prepared are we to stand our ground to share Jesus with others in the face of those who mock and scoff at us?

Although we usually associate Mary with the Easter story, this month on 22nd July, the Church celebrates her Feast Day. In this snapshot of Mary's life we know she had experienced great distress and suffering. After Jesus healed her, Mary expressed her gratitude by being utterly committed and devoted to Him.

Jesus can give everyone a new start; a new purpose and direction in life. Like Mary we can thank Him for blessing us, loving us and forgiving us and moving into practical forms of service. Only Jesus can transform our lives so that we can glorify God in all that we do.



on to use the book 'Not a stick' by Antoinette Portis.





Vinci and the Wright brothers. Who knows




what we can achieve with 'an idea'?

But God was angry and He sent Nathan the prophet








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
