

I have had the privilege of talking to a number of farmers over the past few weeks and one thing has come around again and again. The weather! Everyone I have listened to has told me the same thing. They cannot remember a time when it has been so wet. This provides so many additional challenges for our farmers.

One thing I have reflected upon is how the bad weather and continual rain has left us asking, when will things get better?

As we hear the news and listen to updates about all sorts of things going wrong around the world we might easily lose sight of God's presence with us. It can so often feel like the times are dark. We might find ourselves asking the same question, 'When will things get better?'

This year's Thy Kingdom Come theme is 'Light up the World in Prayer'. Churches are encouraged to join in with the global prayer initiative that asks people to pray for God's kingdom to come. Christians are encouraged to pray from Ascension, when churches remember Jesus ascending into heaven to Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit came on Jesus' disciples in power. They are invited to pray for people to come to know Jesus, The Light of the World. It is an initiative that seeks to see communities transformed.

At St Peter's and St Leonard's we will be holding a prayer picnic (bring your own picnic!), prayer and a brew, and prayer meetings. You are warmly invited to join us for any of these. So, as we long for the better weather, perhaps we can turn to prayer. Prayer that God would be with our farmers and prayer for light in the world, that God's Kingdom may come.


Treasurer needed



Funeral of Martyn Charles Colley, St Mary's, Sandbach

On the 18th April, members of St Peter's Church attended the funeral of Martyn Colley, husband of Revd Jane Colley. The service took the form of one of thanksgiving for a long, full life, well lived.

The church, St Mary's, Sandbach, was packed with people who knew Martyn from the many different aspects of his life; family, friends, work, church, table tennis, choirs, to name a few.

Before the service began we had time to take in the beauty and splendour of the church which had been decorated throughout with white lilies.



We also had a preview of some of the amazing choral music to be sung later in the service.

On arrival, Martyn was carried into church by members of his family, in a coffin completely covered in the most stunning natural looking flower arrangement, very simple, but all the more beautiful for that very reason. The congregation were asked to sing out, so to the uplifting hymn, 'Guide Me, O Thou Great Redeemer', the group processed down the main aisle.

Once everyone had taken their seats the service began, led by The Revd Bee Boyde. The music and readings had all been well chosen, giving us further insight into Martyn's personality. Having sung, 'Now the Green Blade Riseth', Jane very bravely took her place to read the poem by Linda Ellis, The Dash. It urges us to think about the dash between the dates on a headstone. The dash representing the life lived and did we live it to the full and well enough.

Having listened to the tribute by Martyn's son, I can assure you Martyn did live life to the full and was very loved and well thought of by those whose path he crossed. From a tough start in a big family, to working with difficult and challenging children in the UK, to teaching in Pakistan, playing frisbee, playing table tennis, to an elite level, learning to sing to a professional tenor standard and joining numerous choirs, to name but a few of his many achievements in life.

There were readings and prayers by members of the congregation at St Mary's and, as I've already hinted, beautiful choral music by a choir put together of singers from the different groups he sang with. This group was led by John Naylor. They sang, 'How Lovely Are Thy Dwellings Fair', by Brahms whilst we the congregation had time to sit and reflect on Martyn and his very full life.

Further congregational hymns were a modern setting of 'The Lord is My Shepherd' and 'Praise to the Holiest in the Height'.

After the commendation, Martyn's coffin was once again lifted onto the shoulders of his loving family. As they processed out of church, the choir and those of us from St Peter's sang, 'The Lord Bless You and Keep You' by John Rutter, to end what had been a very moving but uplifting service.

As we left the church, each person attending was given a bookmark, a lovely photograph of Martyn, looking very smart in black tie on the front but with the added reminder to live our lives well on the back where Jane had thoughtfully added the poem, The Dash.

Interment was at Sandbach Cemetery followed by refreshments in the church hall.

I think those of us from St Peter's were very pleased we could go and support Jane at this sad time. Jane has been, and remains, a great support to St Peter's and her help on 3rd Sundays is always gratefully received. I spoke to Jane after the service and she was so happy that we'd been there, to show our love not only for her but also for Martyn and the family, some of whom we have come to know over the last few years. We look forward to welcoming Jane back to St Peter's at some point in the future. I know we all wish her well at this sad time.

know what that little line is worth.


For it matters not, how much we own --

News from Warmingham CE Primary School

Over the last year, the Ethos Council have been working with Mrs Allen to develop a definition for spirituality. It has been particularly challenging as spirituality means something different to everyone.

Before sharing their definition with the wider school community they completed some research with the support of Miss Turrell and one of our school governors, Mrs Blease-Bourne.


Their research showed:

- Everyone found our definition difficult to understand so we knew we had to change it.
- Most people used the word 'love' to describe what spirituality meant to them so we knew we needed to include it in our new definition.
- Nobody, including the adults, were able to explain what spirituality means clearly. Lots of people said 'um' a lot!
- We wanted to include 'Let your light shine' if at all possible.

They then went back to the drawing board to improve the definition to:

Spirituality is not something we can see; it is something we feel inside our hearts. It is the love we have for ourselves, each other and God. It helps us to make sense of our world and its wonders so we can let our light shine brightly.

On Monday, Oliver P, Eliza shared our new definition with the children and staff in worship. Over the next term the children will be using the definition to develop their understanding of what spirituality means to us at Warmingham. To help us do this we will have adapted the windows, mirrors and doors approach we already use in school:



Windows – Learning about life

We have opportunities to become *aware* of the world around us; to *wonder* about life's 'Wows' (things that are amazing and unexplainable) and the 'Ows' (things that upset us or make us feel uncertain). This helps us to learn about life in all its fullness.



Mirrors – Learning from life

We have opportunities to *reflect* on our experiences; to *meditate* and *reflect* on life's big questions and to consider some possible answers. This ensures we are learning *from* life by exploring our own thoughts and those of others.



Doors – Learning to live life

We have opportunities to *respond* to all of this; to *do* something creative to express our thoughts and convictions. This encourages us to *put into action* what we believe in and value, whilst ensuring that we stand-up for others.

Towards the end of the summer, the Ethos Council will complete their research – hopefully the children, staff and governors will be able to articulate what spirituality means to us at Warmingham, and the impact it has on us and those around us.

Nici recounted the history of the firm which was founded as Matlow's jelly sweet makers by her great grandfather in the East End of London in 1928. In 1933 the company became Swizzles and started making sherbet and fizzy sweets. In 1940 the company moved out of London to New Mills in Derbyshire and produced many favourites such as Love Hearts, Parma Violets, Drumsticks and Sherbet Lollies to name a few. They have now expanded to their new factory in Middlewich where new technology such as robots are utilised and they produce the popular "Squashies".
