System Update



What's happening in each class this term?

Every half term, our study themes are rooted in the rich, high-quality texts we've chosen to inspire the children's writing. These books don't just support literacy -they spark imagination, curiosity, and deep thinking across our connected curriculum. Whether exploring historical events, fantastical adventures, or real-world dilemmas, each text opens a doorway into new ideas and perspectives.

Our children have always adored these themes. There's something magical about watching a story unfold and seeing how it shapes their writing, discussions, and understanding of the world around them. Books have the power to transport us, challenge us, and connect us - and in the classroom, they become a launchpad for creativity and learning.

Below is a brief outline of what each class will be exploring this half term - look out for the ways these texts will weave into their writing, topic work, and home learning projects.




Otters' Class


Our first study theme for the Autumn term is history based, 'Marvellous me'.

Children will initially begin by settling into school, building routines, and forming positive relationships with peers and adults. Then they will explore personal identity, recognising similarities and differences between themselves and others. Through discussion, play, and creative activities, children will share information about their families, past events in their lives, and important family traditions.

Using early history skills, children will develop an understanding of chronology by sequencing events from their own lives (e.g., "when I was a baby," "now I am at school") and talking about how they have changed over time. They will begin to use historical vocabulary such as *past*, *present*, *old*, *new*, and *change*, making simple comparisons between life now and in the past within their own families.



Hedgehogs' Class




This half term, the Hedgehogs' Class will be exploring the theme of friendship through the story 'Lost and Found' by Oliver Jeffers.

This beautifully illustrated book begins with a boy finding a penguin on his doorstep. The boy decides that he will help the penguin to return to his home. They set out in a row boat together to the South Pole, will the boy be able to get the penguin home?

This lovely story begins our study theme on friendship where we will start by discussing what it means to be a good friend before completing a fun treasure hunt to uncover clues about our new book.

As Writers, we will be using this story to inspire our own adventure tales with new characters. We will also be using this book to explore other areas of our connected curriculum; as Artists we will be exploring the concept of light and dark tones to help us to create our own stormy scene just like the one in 'Lost and Found'. Our learning in science will focus on what animals, including humans, need to survive within hot and cold climates. This will link to our Geography focus where we will be identifying hot and cold climates using a range of atlases and globes. As Historians we will be investigating our own personal history by sequencing events in our own lives. We cannot wait to share all of our learning with you.

Squirrels' Class



With 'Water, water everywhere' as our study theme, the Squirrels Class began with a spectacular 'splashy' start, experimenting with water. We concluded that water has many different unique properties, enabling us to observe it changing images, keeping us dry, travelling from cup to cup without pouring and even remaining in a plastic bag after being pierced!

As our connected curriculum is based around the book Seal Surfer by Michael Foreman, we will continue to explore a watery-based study theme as we learn about the water cycle, the sea and other waterways.



Badgers' Class



This term, our learning will be inspired by the powerful and poignant book *Queen of the Falls* by Chris Van Allsburg - a true story that captures the courage and determination of Annie Edson Taylor, the first person to survive a trip over Niagara Falls in a barrel. Her daring feat will be the spark that ignites our cross-curricular exploration of geography, history, art, and debate.

We'll be diving into the dynamic beauty of waterfalls, using a variety of brushes and techniques to recreate the movement and energy of water in motion. Inspired by the work of John Singer Sargent, children will also explore pencil and charcoal drawing, focusing on different body parts and refining their skills through their personal art portfolios. These will become a space for reflection, growth, and ultimately, the creation of their own masterpieces.

Our geographical lens will focus on two iconic North American regions: Niagara Falls and the Grand Canyon. We'll investigate how these natural wonders were formed, why they are so different, and how they continue to shape the land and lives around them. Children will explore how Niagara Falls is used to generate hydropower, and the environmental impact this has - particularly on local wildlife. We'll also examine how tourism affects both regions, sparking thoughtful discussions about sustainability and stewardship.

We'll delve into the life of Annie Edson Taylor, exploring whether she was a courageous advocate or simply courageous - a question that will lead to rich debate and reflection. We'll also study the fossils found in the Grand Canyon to uncover clues about its ancient past and what it might have looked like millions of years ago.

This term's debates will challenge children to think critically and express their views with confidence. Topics will include:

- Hydropower: Should we use waterfalls to generate electricity if it harms wildlife?
- Annie Edson Taylor: Was she a bold pioneer or a thrill-seeker?
