# How Father Christmas got where he is today



One person you are bound to run into this Christmas season is Father Christmas. These days he seems to frequent shopping malls and garden centres. If he looks tired, just remember that he has been around a long time and gone through a lot of transformations.

Father Christmas wasn't always the red-suited, white-bearded star of the retail trade that he is today. He began life as Nicholas, born way back about AD260 in Patara, an important port on the southern coast of what is now Turkey. When his parents died and left him a fortune, Nicholas gave it away to the poor. He became a bishop of the nearby city of Myra, where he almost certainly suffered persecution and imprisonment at the hand of the Roman Emperor Diocletian.

Nicholas was a serious theologian: he was a participant at the First Council of Nicaea, which formulated the Creed which we still say

today. He even, reportedly, slapped another bishop in a squabble over the exact nature of the Trinity.

Nicholas died in Myra about AD343, but the stories of his generosity and kindness were just beginning. One enduring tale tells of the three girls whom he rescued from certain prostitution by giving them gold for their dowries. When the father confronted him to thank him, Nicholas said he should thank God alone.

In the UK, Nicholas became the basis for Father Christmas, who emerged in Victorian times as a jolly-faced bearded character. Meanwhile, Dutch and German settlers had taken him to America with them as Sinter Klaas and Sankt Nicklas.

It was in America that Nicholas received his final two great breaks into real stardom. The first was when the Rev Clement C Moore, a New York Episcopal minister, turned from his life-work of writing a Hebrew/English lexicon, to write a fun poem for his children one Christmas. His 'The Visit of St Nicholas' is now universally known by its first line: 'T'was the Night Before Christmas'.

From Clement Moore we discovered that St Nicholas is round and pink-cheeked and whitebearded, and that he travels at night with sleigh, reindeer and a sack of toys on his back. It was Clement Moore who also revealed that St Nicholas enters houses down chimneys and fills children's stockings with toys and sweets.

So how did we find out that Father Christmas wears red? That was the US Coca-Cola advertising campaign of 1931, who finally released the latest, up-to-date pictures of Father Christmas: wearing a bright red, fur-trimmed coat and a large belt.

These days, it is good that Father Christmas uses reindeer and doesn't have to pay for petrol. In order to get round all the children in the world on Christmas Eve, he will have to travel 221 million miles at an average speed of 1279 miles a second, 6,395 times the speed of sound. For all those of us who are already exhausted just rushing around getting ready for Christmas, that is a sobering thought.

# **October update**

We want to say a HUGE THANK YOU to all of

you who have collected and donated food particularly this Harvest. An amazing 4,402 kg of food was donated in October! This is a tremendous total and we are so grateful as the pantry had previously become *very* short of a number of food items.

In October St Paul's Pantry provided 217 people with crisis food parcels which represents 83 households.

We are aware that many of you may be thinking of collecting food donations for Christmas. We would really appreciate it if you could get any Christmas food items to us by 10th December in order to ensure that clients receive them in time for Christmas. Please remember that ordinary long life food items are still really the main priority and we are currently continuously short of items such as UHT milk, jam and long life cakes/puddings.

### **Remembrance Sunday**



a wintery, watery sun filtered through the remaining autumnal coloured leaves on the

trees, a small group began to gather in front of the war memorial at Bradfield Green. By 10.45am there were forty-four people and a beautiful black labrador called Hugo, waiting to join in a Service of Remembrance to honour those from the village who had lost their lives in the two World Wars.

Paul Ramsey led the service, a lay reader from St Mary's Nantwich. He began by reading the names and ages of those men who are remembered on the memorial. The oldest amongst them was only 33 years old, a Polish

airman lost in one of the three air accidents that had occurred in the area during World War

2. The youngest was a 17-year-old, lost in World War 1.

The eerie sound of the air-raid siren from the Crewe Railway Works could be heard alongside the sounds of Big Ben to signal the beginning of the two minutes silence. This was very moving and even Hugo the dog stood to attention.

Wreaths were laid by a member of the Parish Council and John Whittingham aged ninety, Freeman of the Village and a member of St Peter's Church.



The service concluded with prayers and the National Anthem before the majority of those assembled made their way to St Peter's for another service in the church.

The church service was very moving as it concluded with those gathered making their way into the churchyard to the grave of John Robinson. John was a boy from the village who sustained severe injuries in World War 1. He was repatriated to hospital in Harrogate, but sadly he succumbed and died from his wounds. Again, John Whittingham laid a wreath on behalf of the congregation.



Those of us who were gathered enjoyed listening to John Whittingham recounting how as a 7-year-old lad he had witnessed the loss of the three aircraft during World War 2 and could tell us exactly where they had fallen and how scary it had been.

As other conversations began to flow, the Davidson family told us how their son Jamie - a historian - working for a production company called Squeaky Pedal had helped them locate one of the graves on the war memorial belonging to the Crawford family. They have now set themselves the task of visiting more of the war cemeteries in Belgium and France in the hope of locating as many of the others as they can.

Considering we are still in the grip of a pandemic the turn out for Remembrance Sunday 2021 was something we at St Peter's can all be enormously proud.






# Minshull URC



# **News for Warmingham CE Primary School**



On Remembrance Day we came together this morning to honour those who served in the armed services and thank them for the sacrifices they made for us.

Red poppies are a symbol of remembrance and hope

for a peaceful future. During WW1, much of the fighting took place in Western Europe. The countryside was blasted, bombed and fought over repeatedly.

Beautiful landscapes turned to mud; bleak and barren scenes replaced them. There was a notable and





striking exception to the bleakness - the bright red poppies.

These resilient flowers flourished in the middle of so much chaos and destruction, growing in the thousands upon thousands.

Some of our relatives and local residents have served in the armed forces to protect us. Some gave their lives for us. We are truly thankful. Three brave young men from Warmingham gave their lives for our country during World War 1:

**Sergeant Richard Ashley** who served in the Cheshire Regiment whose motto was 'Ever Glorious'. He died of his wounds on 19th October 1914, aged 28.

**Private William Boulton** was killed in action on 24th April 1916, aged just 21. He served in the 7th Battalion of The King's Shropshire Light Infantry. The battalion earned the most honours so William was part of a very dedicated and brave group of soldiers.

**Private Joseph Henry Thomas** died of his wounds in October 1918, only days before the Armistice. Like Richard Ashley he served in the First Battalion of the Cheshire Regiment. They would have known each other, and may have even be good friends.

They are commemorated on the brass plaque on the west wall here in St Leonard's. The clock in the clock tower was purchased after the war in their honour.

We are also truly thankful to our brave relatives who served in the armed forces to protect us.

**Officer Carl Hoyle** who served 27 years in the RAF. He completed several tours including some in Afghanistan, Iraq and Bosnia. He even had a mention on the Queen's Honours List and received a medal from her.

**Private Charles Harold William Rawlings** served in the 7th Battalion Worcestershire regiment. He was killed in battle.

Private Dennis Rawlings who was killed in battle.

**Corporal Stewart Butters** served with the Royal Engineers for 13 years. He received medals for serving in Iraq and Afghanistan.

**Corporal Arthur Walker** who was in command of a tank in World War Two. He was involved in the D Day invasion.






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
